The 6th grade reading curriculum is designed to cover the Pennsylvania Common Core Standards through the use of the 6th grade literature textbook, short stories and articles from various resources, novel studies, *Scholastic Scope* magazine, paragraph and essay writing, daily class work and the *Wordly Wise* vocabulary development program. Students will read different genres of fiction, as well as nonfiction and poetry. In addition, writing, speaking, and listening skills are incorporated into the curriculum.

Students will complete assignments through IXL, an online skills and diagnostic program. This resource allows students to review and practice concepts and skills that are assessed on the PSSA and will provide data about their progress.

The following is a guideline of the major units and concepts we will be studying this year. Many of our materials and resources for our units will be housed on our Schoology learning management system. Please regularly check Schoology for information, assignments, and due dates.

Scholastic *Scope* magazine will be used regularly throughout the year to reinforce reading skills taught in the curriculum. In addition, students will be practicing text dependent analysis writing which is assessed on the PSSA. Vocabulary work will be interspersed throughout the year within units and with the Wordly Wise program.

Our novel units focus on the broad overarching ideas of acceptance, diversity, understanding others' perspectives, and overcoming internal struggles. Students will be making connections as they read and will use essential before, during and after reading strategies to enhance their comprehension.

**Novels will be available for personal use and <u>not</u> housed on Schoology. There are audio versions available for students to use. Textbook stories will be uploaded to the Schoology system as necessary. Some stories will be read from the textbook in the classroom.

**The order in which the units are listed is subject to change. Material used for instruction could vary amongst my classes.
