During a special evening ceremony held on Wednesday, April 10, thirty-six high school juniors were inducted into the National Honor Society (NHS). This is a prestigious annual tradition in the Camp Hill School District. In 1921, The National Association of Secondary School Principals (NASSP) officially established NHS. Though many local and regional honor societies existed prior to 1921, this nationwide organization was the first of its kind. Under the leadership of Dr. Edward Rynearson, principal of the Fifth Avenue High School in Pittsburgh, the organization grew from the original Alpha Chapter to more than 1,000 chapters by 1930. Since that time, the NHS organization has developed into one of the country's most highly regarded educational groups.

The four main pillars that have anchored the National Honor Society since its inception are:

- 1. to create enthusiasm for scholarship
- 2. to stimulate a desire to render service
- 3. to promote leadership
- 4. to develop character in the students of secondary schools

Character, service, leadership, and scholarship are at the core of a successful and fulfilling life and are the bedrock of a healthy and productive society.



So what does it mean to become a member of an Honor Society? We know that in the Camp Hill School District it means that these students have been able to maintain the exemplary grade point average that is required for admission. And while academic performance is important, we should not lose sight of the fact that ethics and integrity are at the very core of what it means to be a part of this highly regarded organization. These students are leaders because of their academic achievement and their leadership in sports and/or clubs. John Maxwell states, "A leader is one who knows the way, goes the way, and shows the way." Our new inductees have accepted membership into the National Honor Society and have made a commitment to help others become better leaders themselves. JA BIZTOWN ENGAGES STUDENTS THROUGH SIMULATIONS OF REAL WORLD EXPERIENCES



Fifth grade students may not be old enough to work, carry a debit card, vote, or be the boss of their own business but as citizens of JA BizTown, they can do all of this and more! This program, offered to 5th grade students, involves classroom lessons about real world government and business operations, and culminates with a day-long visit to a fully interactive simulated town facility. In

the weeks leading up to their trip, students participated in a variety of activities to prepare for their roles as workers and consumers. Elections were held for a Mayor and District Attorney that involved campaign posters, speeches, and voting. Camp Hill Mayor Mark Simpson and former Cumberland County District Attorney Dave Freed met with the candidates to discuss what it is like to hold these positions in the real world. When the votes were counted, it was announced that this year's Mayor is Marc Anthony Scaringi and the District Attorney is Colin Murphy.

Following elections, students continued to prepare for their visit by completing job applications and practicing interview skills in an effort to receive a position that would utilize their interests and abilities. Teachers, staff, Lion Foundation employees, Administrators, and the Superintendent all lent a hand in giving personalized interviews to each of the 115 students. With jobs secured, students began working with their business teams to complete budgets, loan applications and create advertisements.

Students visited BizTown on March 29th and thoroughly enjoyed the experience. Principal Sandra Fauser shared, "Without a doubt, it's a program with curriculum that 5th graders will remember for years to come." A special thank you to The Lion Foundation for funding this unique program.

- Hoover Elementary welcomed the class of 2032 and their families during Kindergarten Registration Day.



SAFETY SOCIALS PROVIDE UNIQUE OPPORTUNITIES FOR STAFF

Learning how to control bleeding from an injury or protect yourself from an attack is not part of a typical work day for Camp Hill School District employees but thanks to CHSD's Safety Committee, opportunities like this are made possible. Throughout the school year, Safety Socials covering a variety of topics are held for teachers and staff. In December, representatives from Geisinger Medical provided *Stop The Bleed*

training where employees learned how to control bleeding as a result of trauma. In February, members of law enforcement taught basic self defense techniques and verbal confrontation skills. Past Safety Socials have included AED (automatic external defibrillator) and fire extinguisher demonstrations. These interactive trainings provide unique opportunities to learn basic skills that could help save a life!
